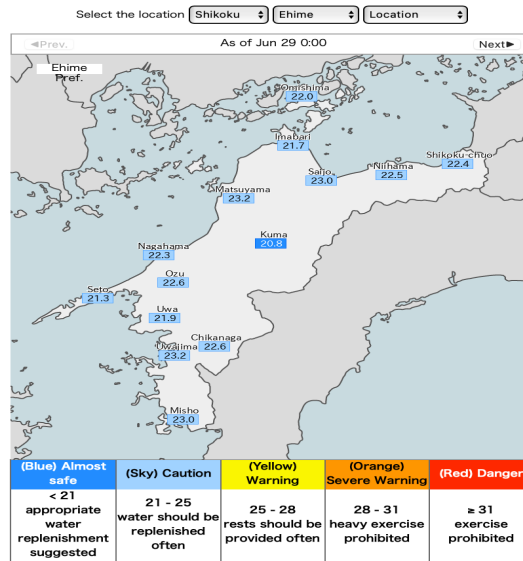


## Heat Warning Index

The Japanese government uses the international Wet Bulb Globe Temperature index to provide a warning system for heat stress on the body. Temperature is not the only concern; humidity increases the danger. You can check the WBGT index for Ehime in English at this site:

## Be Prepared for an Earthquake

You know you need to earthquake-proof where you live by securing furniture so it won't fall over on you. Be sure to download one of the apps above to have information if there is a big disaster. Don't forget to find out where the evacuation center is near you.

It is also a good idea to have an emergency supply of water and food. Look for water that is good for several years. It can be found where emergency supplies are sold. (The kind usually sold is not safe for that long.)

One place to look is a Daiki store. Ask for *bosai yohin*. For example, the Kinuyama Daiki has food, water, portable toilets, and more. Just go to aisle 81 and go to the back of the store. Be sure to have a 5-day supply of food and water. The recent Noto earthquake has taught us that it can take time for services such as water and electricity to be restored.
